

GLOBAL CRISIS



The COVID-19 Emergency Response Fund supported agencies and organizations struggling to meet emerging or increased needs due to COVID-19. Support in the areas of emergency food, access to mental health programs, support for vulnerable seniors in isolation and increased supply of hygiene products were among those most requested needs in the early days of the pandemic. Needs shifted as restrictions were extended and changed to include new methods of service delivery and supporting connections to mitigate long-term effects of social isolation.

#UNIGNORABLE

COVID-19 is not the only crisis we are facing in Niagara.

Social issues like poverty, deteriorating mental health, addiction, social isolation and domestic violence were amplified as restrictions forced individuals and families out of work and into isolation at home. But what if there is no safe place to call home? More Niagara residents than ever are in need of support.

"At a young age I was exposed to the violence and insecurity of street life without any idea on how to survive on my own. I spent 12 years homeless, living in constant fear. Stepping through the doors of the shelter was life-changing. I was welcomed with open arms where the staff made me feel safe for the first time. In my three month stay at the emergency shelter, I learned so many valuable skills. Having a roof over my head and food in my stomach was no longer my only concern. I took advantage of every program they had and credit all the support I received to my success in transitional housing. I am no longer homeless, I have a job I enjoy, an apartment to call my own and a healthy vision for the future. Thank you for saving my life."

POVERTY IN NIAGARA

Poverty is a complex social issue. Experiencing and living in poverty will affect every aspect of a person's life: child development, access to education and support services, housing, employment, food security and our overall physical and mental health and wellbeing. Prior to the pandemic, 1 in 7 people in Niagara were living in poverty. Unemployment rates and income loss have been at an all-time high this past year and have increased the number of those experiencing poverty.

People are spending a significant portion of their already low income to maintain increased housing and food costs. The economic impacts are even more pronounced in marginalized groups as the ripple effect of this pandemic will be felt for years to come. Only time will tell the true damage COVID-19 has caused, but for now, we know the demand for social services has nearly doubled across Niagara.

FOOD

Access to quality, nutritious food is fundamental to human existence. Secure access to food can produce wide ranging positive impacts including: economic growth, job creation, poverty reduction, social connectedness and overall health, physical and mental wellbeing. Access to enough food for growing children and families is essential to the health of our community as a whole.

The number of families who struggle to put good food on the table is increasing as a result of layoffs, the economic downturn and isolation caused by the pandemic. We know the most significant factor of being food insecure is the lack of income. Niagara food banks reported an increase in demand of up to 30% since the onset of the pandemic as more people than ever turned to them for the first time. Access to community food programs, food banks and community gardens is essential to bridging the income gap many people in Niagara face.

"Before my husband's illness, I never thought I would be in need of assistance for food. When we got the bad news, I instantly fell to my knees. Without an income, life became overwhelming. The bills were due and the cupboards were bare. We were desperate thinking how we would put food on the table. With the generosity of our community and the help we received, I have been relieved of my distress. We were given what we needed during this time of vulnerability. Thanks to you, we have had healthy meals on our table through this horrific time."

SOCIAL ISOLATION AND MENTAL HEALTH

The COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting economic downturn have negatively affected many people's mental health and created new barriers for those already experiencing mental illness or substance use disorders. As the pandemic wears on, ongoing public health measures are pushing more people to situations linked to poor mental health outcomes, such as isolation and job loss. The effects are widespread in Niagara.

Particularly concerning are the levels of suicidal thinking and self-harm, which have increased significantly since before the pandemic (+2.5%) and are further magnified (up to 20%) in certain sub-groups of the population who were already experiencing stigma, exclusion, racism and discrimination. Specifically, suspected opioid overdoses have increased by over 25% since pre-pandemic days.

Seniors experienced some of the worst outcomes including increased anxiety, depression, poor sleep quality and physical inactivity during the isolation period. We recognize the importance of mental well-being, especially during challenging times such as these. That is why United Way made significant investments this year in programs and initiatives that support the mental well-being of the most vulnerable members of our community.


United Way's social isolation strategy supports programs and initiatives that help individuals build meaningful relationships and feel more included in the social fabric of their communities. The strategy focuses on creating opportunities to participate in community, forming and maintaining social networks, and establishing inclusive environments where people live, play, and work.

Programs addressing mental health and social isolation were forced to pivot quickly due to restrictions and United Way was there to support them. Thanks to your support, we invested in technology, virtual programming and increasing capacity for support across Niagara.

EMPOWERING WOMEN AND FAMILIES

COVID-19 has created unprecedented challenges for people across our community. Women and children have been particularly vulnerable to the negative economic and social impacts of the pandemic. Job losses in industries such as food service, tourism and hospitality, have disproportionately impacted women. In addition to these job losses, uncertainty around childcare and school closures have forced many more women out of the workforce. For families with a low-income, the financial impact of these job losses can be absolutely devastating. The financial and emotional stress of the pandemic has taken a toll on the mental health of women and families. The number of people experiencing mental health challenges relating to isolation, anxiety, and stress has grown over the past year. This becomes particularly dangerous when families are isolated in an abusive household. In 2020, domestic violence calls in Niagara nearly doubled.

The impact of the pandemic on the lives of women and children in Niagara will be felt for years to come. Children and youth are resilient, but they require support from their community to overcome challenges and reduce barriers to success. We will continue to focus on supporting a network of programs that aim to create a safe community where everyone has an opportunity to reach their full potential.



Hygiene kits provide every day essential items to people living in poverty and/or experiencing homelessness across Niagara. 3,454 kits were distributed to individuals in need across Niagara's 12 municipalities. Items included in each kit:

Through a vast network of **979** community garden plots, the Niagara Community Garden Network (NCGN) is increasing food security for some of Niagara's most marginalized residents. Community gardens were deemed essential as an important food source for residents last spring. Programs run by NCGN were primarily virtual in 2020 yet still supported thousands in Niagara.

105 social enterprise workshops held.



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
